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True Crime Class Explores Podcasting at LeMoyne College's Keenan Center for Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Creativity

The True Crime class at Westhill High School visited LeMoyne College's Keenan Center for Entrepreneurship, Innovation, and Creativity to delve into the power of podcasting. After listening to a local podcast entitled Firecracker, The Murder of Carol Ryan, students had the opportunity to talk about the local cold case and obtain expert advice from its creator Katrina Tulloch, a journalist for Syracuse.com. The students are now exploring a true crime case of their own choosing, uncovering the facts through in-depth research, and learning the art of storytelling by creating their own podcasts. After touring the Keenan Center facility, students received a "Crash Course" in the essentials of podcasting, covering best practices, storytelling techniques, and technical aspects. Students then collaboratively created a podcast trailer that would entice the audience to listen to their full episode. Students were able to record their trailers with the Keenan Center's digital media/recording studio - a real-world professional experience. Students will finish recording their podcasts at Westhill High School on USB microphones and headsets funded by a generous Westhill Educational Foundation grant. Through scripting, recording, and editing their podcasts, students are gaining valuable skills while learning about the ethical considerations involved in discussing real-life events, ensuring that their work is informative, compelling, and respectful. Fall Teams Earn NYSPHSAA Academic Honors

Insights and Inspirations with Jennifer Nielsen, Penny Feeney

This grant is designed to generate excitement for an upcoming visit to Onondaga Hill Middle School from author Jennifer Nielsen, which will take place in April 2024. In addition to funding a daily author book giveaway the month before the visit, the grant will also help to fund a breakfast and lunch for students to interact with the visiting author.

P.S. I Love You, Tracy Derrenbacher

This grant will fund programming for P.S. I Love You Day at Onondaga Hill Middle School in February 2024. This year's program will continue to shine a spotlight on mental health issues and bullying and will also focus on acceptance of others. This grant will enable each first grade classroom at Walberta Park to experience the incubation and hatching of chicks. They will learn about the life cycle and how to care for living things. This will also be a culminating activity to a month long ELA module on birds, as well as a science kit on how living things stay safe and grow.

Picture This: New Graphic Novels and Manga at Westhill High School, Jessica Regitano

This grant will provide funds to the Westhill High School library to add to their collection of Manga and Graphic Novels. The popularity of these books, in concert with their many academic benefits and ability to increase accessibility to literature for students with disabilities and English Language Learners, make this format an essential component of the Westhill High School Library collection.

Day of Jazz, Liz Buell

This grant supports Westhill Day of Jazz which brings a professional jazz band to the Westhill Community for a day-long event. On April 11, 2024, there will be two performances for students in grades 5-12, followed by afternoon workshops for instrumental and vocal jazz bands in grades 6-12. The day will conclude with a public performance by the visiting band and Westhill students.

Cherry Road School Peace Path, Karen McNary

This grant funded the purchase of Peace Walk mats for the Cherry Road School playground to provide a tangible way to settle disputes during recess and practice for classroom conflicts.

Handwriting without Tears, Kyla Pecora

This grant provides funding for Handwriting without Tears teaching materials for the 12:1:4 classroom at Cherry Road School. This program will help students learn proper letter formation and letter identification.

Podcast Project, Sarah Starowicz

As part of the English department's elective course, True Crime, Westhill High School Students will be collaborating with the Keenan Center For Entrepreneurship, Innovation, and Creativity at LeMoyne College to learn about the essentials of podcasting, covering best practices, storytelling techniques, and technical aspects. This grant provides funding to equip a classroom with podcast stations to give students the ability to record their own podcasts. The equipment will allow students to record, edit, and layer music/sound effects into their podcast to create a more professional and creative project and will also be used in future courses at WHS.

Boundless Books, Stephanie Merritt

This grant will provide funding for a kindergarten class at Walberta Park School to partner with a 5th grade class at VanDuyn Elementary School to write and illustrate a book. Students will collaborate virtually to write a book about welcoming new students, which will tie in to social studies lessons. The book will then be printed and each student will receive a copy of their own.

Transportation to Nonpublic Schools

Following the guidelines of Section 3635 of New York State Education Law, the Westhill Central School District is advising the parents of students seeking transportation to a nonpublic school that a written request must be submitted to the Westhill Board of Education by April 1st of the preceding year. New residents may submit their request after the April 1st deadline, but must do so within thirty days after establishing residence in the district and must also submit a residency affidavit. The school board may refuse to grant a late transportation request form may be received directly from the nonpublic school at the time of enrollment and must be completed and received at the Westhill Central School District prior to April 1, 2023. The transportation request form and residency affidavit may be found on the Westhill CSD website under Transportation.

On days in which public schools are scheduled to be closed, in accordance with the Westhill School District calendar, the district is not obligated to transport to the nonpublic schools. Under no circumstances may transportation be provided on legal holidays or Saturdays.

Universal Pre-K - 2024-2025 School Year

The Westhill Central School District is pleased to once again offer a 4-year-old UPK program for the 2024-2025 school year.

To be eligible, a child must:

- Have a birthdate between December 2, 2019 and December 1, 2020.
- Reside in the Westhill Central School District.
- Agree to attend the program 6 hours a day for 5 days per week.

Instruction is consistent with the New York State Pre-Kindergarten Standards, which focuses on a child's social/emotional, cognitive and physical development.

Those who submit an interest form online and complete the registration process between January 22 and March 31 will be considered for the lottery selection process to be held in early April. If there are more students interested than seats available, a random, computerized lottery will be held. All families will be contacted to be updated on their child's status of accepted or waitlisted. Registration packets will be mailed to accepted families after the lottery is conducted.

It is important to note the UPK Program is not housed in Westhill Central School District school buildings. Instead, the district partners with the YMCA (OCC campus location). Transportation to and from the program is the responsibility of parents/guardians. Students must attend the program five days a week to maintain their seat.
